Bike Match: The Ortega Family

Early in the winter of of 2021, Bikes Not Bombs was connected with the Ortega family from Nicaragua,

thanks to longtime BNB volunteer Chris Gruener. The Ortegas, a family seeking political asylum in Newton, MA, requested three bicycles through [Bike Match](#).

The Ortega family, made up of Moisés, Jessica, and their ten year old daughter, Camila, are victims of unthinkable political persecution and torture. Shortly before landing in Massachusetts, the Ortegas hid in a small attic of a Nicaraguan safehouse. Their story was recently featured on an episode of NPR's This American Life ([Episode 721: The Walls Close In](#)). *Content warning: graphic and horrific descriptions of state-run torture and violence.*

Thanks to generous bike donors like Steve Murphy, who raised over \$5,000 to support getting bikes out to people in need, our Bike Shop & Training Center staff were able to identify three bicycles for the Ortega family to get around town (including helping Camila get to and from school). The resilience of the Ortega family is truly inspiring, and Bikes Not Bombs is honored to have been able to contribute.

Donor of the Month: James Selkin

Bikes Not Bombs recognizes James Selkin of Denver, Colorado as our February 2022 Donor of the Month. James was a longtime donor to Bikes Not Bombs. **After his passing in November 2020, we were informed that he bequeathed a parcel of land in Lincoln Hills, CO to BNB.** According to his daughter Joelle Wedel, James was an avid cyclist, often touring in the U.S. and France with a childhood friend from the Bronx, the late Bert Scharf of Brookline, MA. James and Bert had both been involved in youth organizations, and were both committed to the BNB mission.

Joelle recalls that, prior to his death, her father was adamant about giving this particular parcel of land to Bikes Not Bombs. The parcel was part of a resort development created for Black families in the 1920s. At that time, Denver's vibrant Black community faced increasing hostility in the form of racially restrictive housing covenants and a resurgent Ku Klux Klan that claimed 50,000 members across Colorado. This animosity stimulated the development of Lincoln Hills, a resort community with a mission to give Black families in Denver and across the country a place to escape the daily burden of racism. This refuge was an alternative to the white only resorts that were prevalent at the time. James Selkin purchased one of the parcels of land that were made available to Black families to build cabins or campsites at the resort. Joelle remembers that her father enjoyed going up there.

Black musicians such as Duke Ellington, Count Basie, and Lena Horne often stayed at the Lincoln Hills resort before or after playing in Denver clubs. Langston Hughes and Zora Neale Hurston visited the resort and held readings at Lincoln Hills on their way to the West Coast. With the approval of James Selkin's children, Bikes Not Bombs is donating the parcel of land to a youth development organization, [Lincoln Hill Cares](#), which operates at the site of the former Lincoln Hills retreat. Like BNB, Lincoln Hills Cares develops the next generation of young leaders through outdoor education and recreation, cultural history exploration, and workforce advancement. Their programs empower youth who may not otherwise have the opportunity due to economic, social or family circumstances.

Please join us in remembering James Selkin and honoring the Lincoln Hills stewards of Black culture, racial justice, and youth empowerment.
