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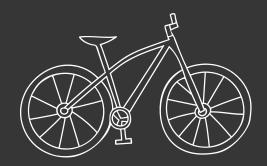
Youth Pathways Objectives

Youth Pathways provides Black and marginalized youth in Boston with the tools and opportunities they need to succeed in sustainable, long-term careers and to see themselves as drivers of positive change.

Youth Apprentices engage in work-based learning across all BNB operations – teaching bike mechanics and safe riding, organizing for transportation justice through Bicyclists Organizing for Community Action (BOCA) initiatives, refurbishing bikes for donation, and working in our full-service bike shop. With the encouragement of a team of youth development, mechanics, organizing, and operations professionals, Youth Apprentices build the skills and confidence needed to step up as leaders among their peers and in their communities.

Apprentices' work-based experiences become a launchpad to plan for their future, stretching the bounds of what they thought was possible. Apprentices meet regularly with our Youth Development and Transitional Manager to identify strengths and interests and to develop a tailored, long-term Career Action Plan to prepare them for post-secondary success and well-being.

Goal: Black and other marginalized youth from Boston's most underserved neighborhoods have the resources they need to thrive in sustainable long-term career pathways.

DEMOGRAPHICS

BNB's Youth Pathways program primarily engages Black and other marginalized youth ages 15-24 who live in low-income households in Dorchester (\$29,767), Mattapan (\$28,356), and Roxbury (\$20,978), which have per capita income far below that of Boston as a whole (\$44,690). These neighborhoods' residents are primarily Black, Hispanic, or other people of color (ranging from 77% - 94%), with the highest proportion being Black residents.

Despite living in communities steeped in rich cultural heritage and powerful community ties, too many young people who hail from our target neighborhoods grow up with the effects of trauma from repeated exposure to personal racism.

Moreover, these youth face significant challenges in securing the resources needed to thrive, due to centuries of systemic disinvestment in communities of color.

Youth Pathways programming contributes directly and intentionally to advancing racial equity and economic opportunity for Black youth, recognizing that pathways to meaningful, sustainable careers serve as pathways to the ability to thrive.

Outcomes

Competency-Based Assessments: Guage increase in technical skills and soft skills. **Career Action Plans:** Map course for post-secondary employment and/or eduction.

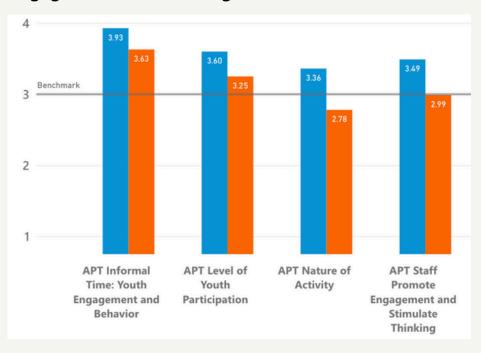
Note: In 2025, BNB built capacity to track the long-term career and educational pathways of Youth Pathways alumni. We look forward to sharing this data in future years.

Engagement and Learning

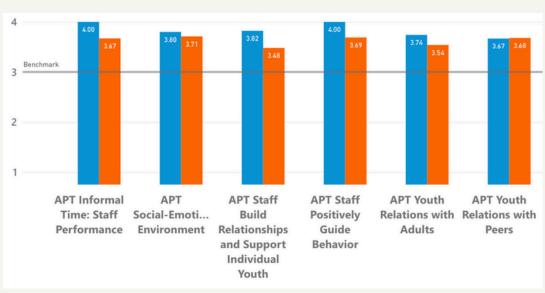


Grey = National Benchmark
